


## How much have you learned about the Games?

Explain your design here.






### CREATE A WORD SEARCH

## CAN YOU WRITE A MINI SAGA?

To write a mini saga you need to plan your content carefully and write a first draft. Then you need to adjust the number of words by rephrasing some sentences, adding more descriptive words or using contractions like 'they're' instead of 'they are'.

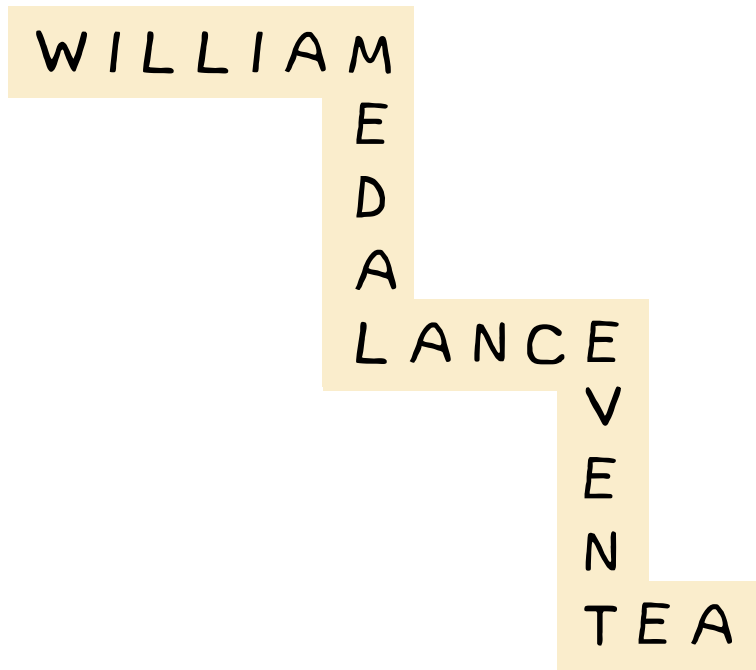

## How much have you learned about the Games?

### CREATE A LOGICAL LADDER

Logical ladders are ladders made of connected words. Each word is connected to the next by the ending letter of one and the beginning letter of the next. Every word in the ladder must also be connected to the theme, in our case the Olympian Games.

The building of your ladder might look like this.



Can you explain how all of these words are connected to the Wenlock Olympian Games?

Words cannot be repeated and plurals are not permitted. If you cannot justify or explain the connection each word has to the story of the Olympian Games then it cannot be allowed. Each acceptable word earns you one point. The winner is the person with the longest ladder of connected words and the most points. Set yourself a time limit and work together in small teams or alone.

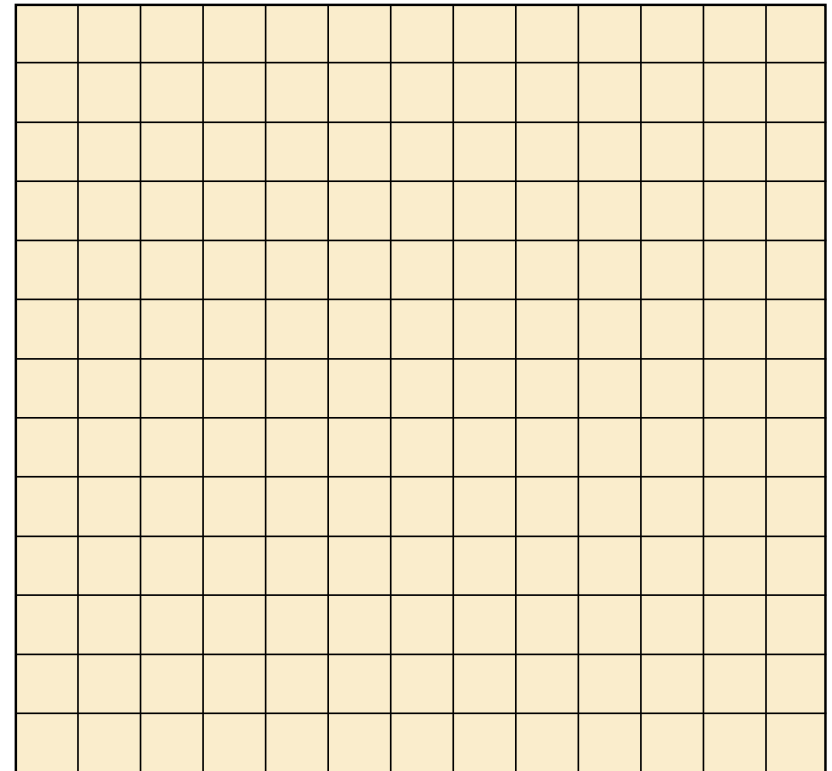

Now number your answers and write a clue for each one. This is your solution. Colour in the unused squares and copy your puzzle out without the answers.

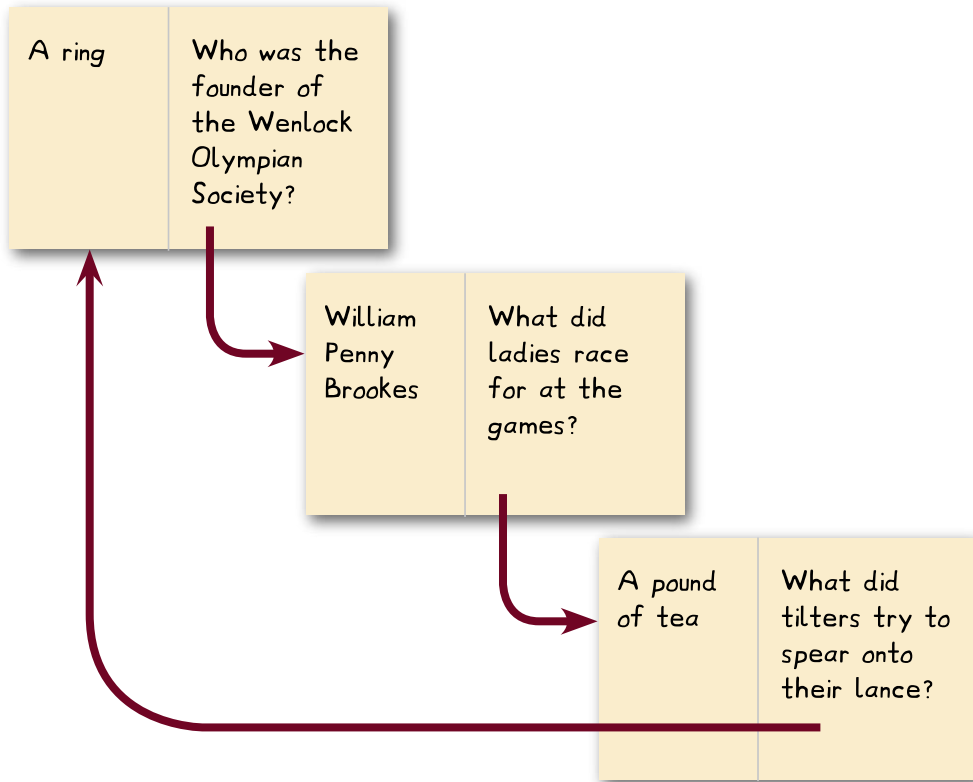
Swap your crossword with your friends or work together to make one giant one.
